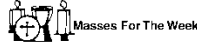

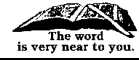

Black Catholic History Month 2021

On July 24, 1990, the National Black Clergy Caucus of the United States designated November as Black Catholic History Month to celebrate the long history and proud heritage of Black Catholics. During this month, take time to share in remembrance of our journey as a people and our personal journeys as individuals and families. Gather together and share our written and visual memories.

The National Black Catholic Clergy chose November for several reasons:

November 1 – All Saints Day – an opportunity to review lives of saints of African decent living in the first 300 years of Church history:

November 2 – All Souls Day – a time to remember the Africans lost in cruel treatment in the Middle passage crossing the Atlantic Ocean:

November 3 – Feast of St. Martin de Porres, who had been the only saint of African descent in this hemisphere:

November 20th – the death of Zumbi Palmares in Brazil, the South American founder of a free state for Blacks.

Black Catholic History Trivia

The story of St. Charles Lwanga and the Ugandan Martyrs.

St. Charles Lwanga and twenty-one other young men died for their faith on June 3, 1886. They lived in the kingdom of Buganda, now part of the country of Uganda, in Africa. The young men, many in their teens, were killed because they challenged the king’s practices and called attention to his sins. This story highlights that they kept their faith unto death, and celebrated their execution with joy. What a great witness of love! The Martyrs of Uganda were beatified in 1902 and canonized by Pope Paul VI on October 18, 1964. Their feast is celebrated on June 3.
