Bi-Monthly Healing Mass on November 21 at St. Joseph Cathedral: A Mass of Healing and Healing Service will be celebrated on Monday, November 21, 6:30 p.m. at St. Joseph Cathedral, 212 East Broad St., Columbus. Following the Mass, a Service of Healing will begin with Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, Veneration of relic of the True Cross of Christ, followed by an opportunity for each person to speak individually with a priest and receive a prayer of healing for what they seek; the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick will also be available. The service of Healing will close with Benediction. All persons who seek Christ's healing are invited--especially those who suffer with physical illness and infirmities, in addition to those seeking emotional and spiritual healing. All caregivers, family members and members of the medical community are invited as well. Parking is available at the rear of the Cathedral accessible off East Gay Street; handicap accessible elevator is located in the courtyard (west side of the Cathedral) on East Broad Street. Garden Farewell

Crisp autumn days and chilly nights mean time to put the garden to rest. This year has been successful in many ways. Many of the plants did well and were shared with the neighborhood folks and some parishioners too. Favorites were sweet cherry tomatoes and hot chili peppers. Since they grow fast and furious when they get started, the neighbors picked the jalapenos, banana and hot chili peppers as soon as they grew. Green tomatoes were more popular than the ripe ones! The surprise star of the garden was okra. Not only because people really like them, but the blossom is a beautiful yellow with a purple center and the plant grow really tall. Okra is one of the vegetables that were brought over from Africa with the slave trade, along with greens and yams and sweet potatoes. I learned that the okra should be picked when they are smaller before they get woody and produce that slimy texture that people dislike about it. The green beans were enjoyed by many and the more they were picked, the more they grew. The chard was a hard sell at first, but apparently caught on as the summer progressed. Some hardy greens will be able to withstand the cold and be tenderized by the first frost. The Neighborhood House children were frequent visitors to the garden to water the plants through the hot humid days. They witnessed the development of plants from seeds to buds, blossoms and fruit. Many of them made the link from what they learned in class to actually having hands on experiences. Plants and children are in so many ways the same. They both need an enriched environment, space to grow and stretch nourishment and protection from harmful elements that stunt them from growing to their greatest capacity. Thanks to all who helped in ways great and small. Next year we hope to be even better. Look for announcements to start next spring. Veteran gardeners and their years of experience are most welcome for suggestions to make the garden even better!
